Hamilton bike facts - part one

- Hamilton has growing and young population of 150,000 increasing by 2,000 every year
- Hamilton is flat and has mostly wide roads
- Hamilton City Council teams are passionate. We have a City Bike plan called "Bike Hamilton"
- NZTA Waikato have a focus on walking and cycling in their <u>long term programme work</u>




Hamilton bike facts - part two

Our challenges:

- We are bridge city with a lot of roundabouts
- Previous Council had given us patchy support for biking in the past, but we have seen improvements post the inclusion of funding on the 10 year plan.
- 32% of land freight travel though Waikato. There are a lot of trucks on our roads!
- Waikato has twice the number of head on crashes than any other region
- A <u>recent study</u> shows Hamilton's active transport level fares poorly against the other NZ cities.

Hamilton City 10 Year Plan

CAN and Generation Zero have campaigned hard to get bike funding included into this plan

Bike Hamilton Plan our focus is:

- Completion of Western Rail Trail (WRT) in April 2017
- Hamilton East School link project

A project will link 15 schools between, Wairere Drive in the north to Clyde Street in the south. These infrastructure improvements will be supported by road safety and promotional activities.

Hamilton Urban Cycleways Programme

The Urban Cycleways Programme was announced by the Prime Minister on 18 August 2014, with the aim of making significant improvements to cycling infrastructure in the main urban centres. e.g Western Rail Trail(WRT)

Green Ring Project

Hamilton Green Ring is a project initiated by Hamilton Urban Blog, to link the various parks comprising Hamilton's historic town belt, providing an off-road route for walkers and cyclists. A recreational resource par excellence. This project is NOT in any Hamilton plan

Safe Roads Alliance

Made up of the NZ Transport Agency and infrastructure consultancies <u>Beca</u>, <u>Bloxam</u>, <u>Burnett & Olliver (BBO)</u> and <u>Northern Civil Consulting (NCC)</u>, the Alliance will work with stakeholders to deliver timely and tangible improvements to New Zealand roads, helping to reduce deaths and serious injuries.

- SH3 Ohaupo to Te Awamutu
- SH1B Taupiri to Gordonton

Cycle path across the city (Western Rail Trail to Eastside)


Roundabouts... so many roundabouts

Our last key concern: Parking










An additional scheme has been drafted which would result in the majority of the Garden Place being available for parking by vehicles. The proposed layout is shown below:
